As part of the May 22<sup>nd</sup> award ceremony celebrating Manitowish Waters' Leaders of Historic Preservation, Jim Bokern shared a robust presentation on the Earliest Pioneers of Manitowish Waters, featuring 11 first families who arrived before 1900. These early families shared an amazing work ethic, a love of the Northwoods, and a dedication to building our community.

For instance, both Abe LaFave and Robert Loveless arrived first at Mann's Manitowish Resort on Trout Lake in the early 1890's as young men with great ambition and keen skills as woodsmen. After working as guides and loggers, each man followed a different path to helping build what would become Manitowish Waters.

LaFave began to expand his guiding service into a series of tent camps on Island Lake and formally

established his Island Lake Resort by 1895. Abe and his wife Sarah worked tirelessly, building their resort and raising a large family on the island. LaFave's prowess as a guide, resort owner and his athletic 6'4" frame added to his legendary identity as a hardnosed Northwoodsman.

Loveless was of a smaller frame, but possessed equally large desires to succeed and a unique creative flair. Loveless' skill as a talented woodsman and guide caught the attention of Richard Southgate, and Loveless became the caretaker of Southgate's ambitious wilderness estate on Little Trout Lake. After Southgate's death, Loveless developed his Alder Lake property, which showcased his many gifts. Loveless continued as a guide, caretaker, builder and logger.

A local Renaissance man of sorts, Loveless expanded his areas of expertise to include musician, daredevil tight rope walker, saw mill operator, entertainment promoter, dance hall operator, owner of multiple resorts, proprietor of a roadside store and gas station, saloon keeper, inventor, moonshiner and zoo keeper.

The LaPorte family arrived in 1889, according to Ruth Gardner. Henry and Susan LaPorte worked at the Rest Lake Dam lumber camp, likely run by the Mississippi River Logging Company. Based in Marathon County, the LaPortes traveled seasonally in order to make a living, wintering in the Northwoods for logging, and timber cruising during the summer and fall. The LaPortes were very transient and industrious, relocating several times a year to new communities to complete a variety of tasks associated with the logging and lumber industries. According to Henry and Susan LaPorte's obituaries. they moved permanently to the town of Manitowish at the turn of the 20th century. Members of the larger LaPorte family ultimately were pioneers of the communities of Mercer, Manitowish and Manitowish Waters.

#### North Lakeland Elementary School Field Trip

A group of 12 budding historians and students from North Lakeland Elementary visited Koller Library on September 23<sup>rd</sup> to see what Manitowish Waters Historical Society resources were available for their National History Day projects. The students were guided by the theme of "Breaking Barriers in History."

MWHS president **Jim Bokern** made a presentation on how to set up and write their reports, and also gave them ideas on subjects for their reports, using information from the MWHS website. **Kay Krans** from the North Lakeland Discovery Center also talked about the Civilian Conservation Corp camps, and **Janelle Kohl** took the students through the library to point out additional resources.

"The kids were very interested, and one of the students said to me that she learned the most from the MWHS than from any of the other sites they visited that day," Kohl shared.

#### **Meet Our First Intern!**

The Manitowish Waters Historical Society was fortunate to have our first intern, **Emily Magyar**, this summer.

# Do any of these men look familiar? Well, they were members of the Civilian Conservation Corps 660th Company from Camp Mercer. During the winter of 1933-34, they were setting the concrete and steel footings for the new 100-foot fire tower for Rest Lake on top of the hill behind Angler's.

The new tower replaced a 55-foot tower built in 1912. Over the years, the fire tower was manned by state forest rangers, CCC men and YCC boys from State House Lake.
